Dear Wilderness Volunteers Supporters,

This year proved to be extraordinary for Wilderness Volunteers through the 45 projects that were completed on public lands throughout the U.S. In 2018, 442 volunteers from all corners of the country came together and poured their hearts into accomplishing the seemingly never-ending list of backlogged work between the U.S. Forest Service, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife. Our volunteers completed various projects dealing from trail maintenance, invasive plant removal, illegal campsite removal & restoration, and even greenhouse work. Through our volunteers' hard work and tenacity, they provided roughly \$349,000 in volunteer labor. There is nothing I can write to accurately convey my awe and an endless appreciation for our volunteers. They remind me that the goodness of humanity still exists and they inspire me to keep moving forward in a world which is sometimes overwhelming.

2018 also held some very proud moments for Wilderness Volunteers as we received the 2017 National Park Service Wes Henry National Wilderness Stewardship Award (non-government partner category) in Washington, D.C. We are extremely honored to have been recognized for all the work our volunteers have accomplished in over 230 week-long service projects throughout the National Park System and look forward to many more years working with the NPS.

We also continued to offer the Victor Nathan Siwa Memorial Scholarship to eligible applicants, supported an alternative spring break project for DePaul University in Chicago, welcomed Mary Sanders as our 2018 intern, and forged into new waters with a new project at Virgin Islands National Park, St. John. Late summer saw a changing of the Program Manager guards as Taryn Schreiner moved on to accomplish some exciting goals and I was warmly welcomed to fill her boots.



The future is bright but it does not come without challenges. The words "now more than ever" glare in my mind when considering the state of our public lands in tandem with Wilderness Volunteers' mission. Our objective of stewardship of America's wildlands through organizing and promoting volunteer service is needed now more than ever as federal public land agencies



are in a perpetual state of catch-up. In this digital age, we find ourselves in a bittersweet position. We have more people than ever heading outside to explore and experience, which is amazing. On the other hand, with more visitors comes greater adverse impacts on our national parks, designated wilderness areas, refuges and more. Wilderness Volunteers has spent the last 21 years trying to bridge that gap and preserve our public lands for future generations. By getting volunteers in the field to complete these essential stewardship efforts, we can facilitate accessibility for outdoor recreation in our public lands while lowering the adverse impacts of overuse, reducing erosion, improving watershed health, and improving wildlife habitat through planting native plants and removing invasive species.

I would be remiss if I didn't emphasize how important our amazing volunteers and leaders are. Without you, accomplishing this work would not be possible. You invest your time, labor, and resources to protect the lands you love. My deepest gratitude for your invaluable role in Wilderness Volunteers and in the future of our public lands.

An equal contributor to our successful year is the incredibly generous donors - individual, foundation, and corporate – who allow us to continue our mission and give something back. Without your generosity, we would not be able to make a difference in the stewardship of our public lands.

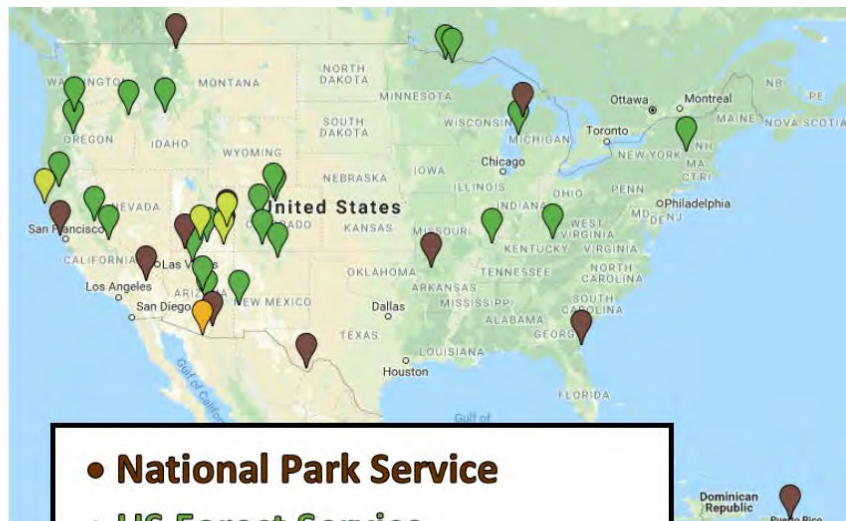
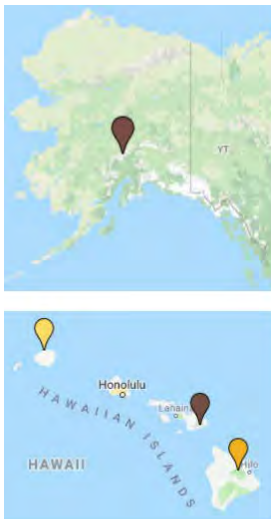

Our volunteers hiked, backpacked and paddled for miles to get to and from work sites. They carried packs, food, tools, equipment and canoes, moved tons of materials, cleaned countless rocks & branches off trails, and removed innumerable pieces of trash from trails, forests and beaches, all while making it look easy.







In addition to the physical work completed in 2017, each of our volunteers developed a deep personal connection to the area they visited while working to care for our public lands.

These immersive wilderness experiences cultivate a sense of commitment to the land, creating wilderness advocates who will work for the protection and preservation of our wild lands for years to come.

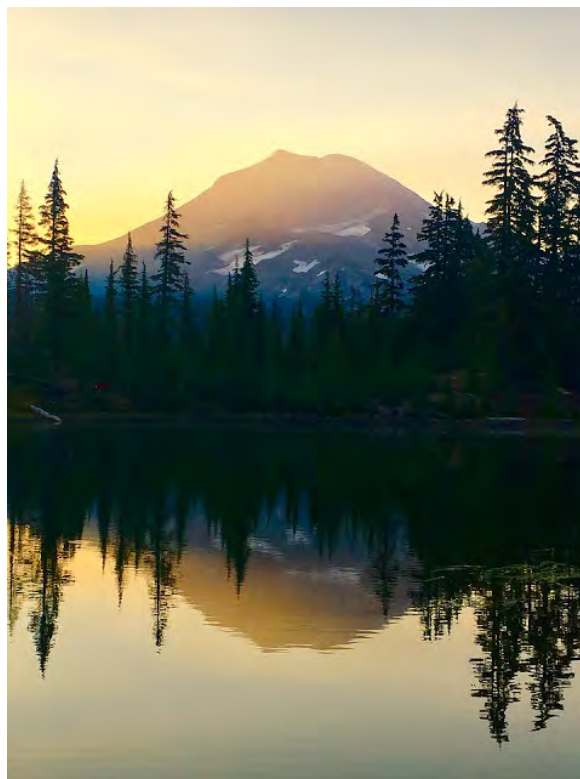

Wilderness Volunteers Intern

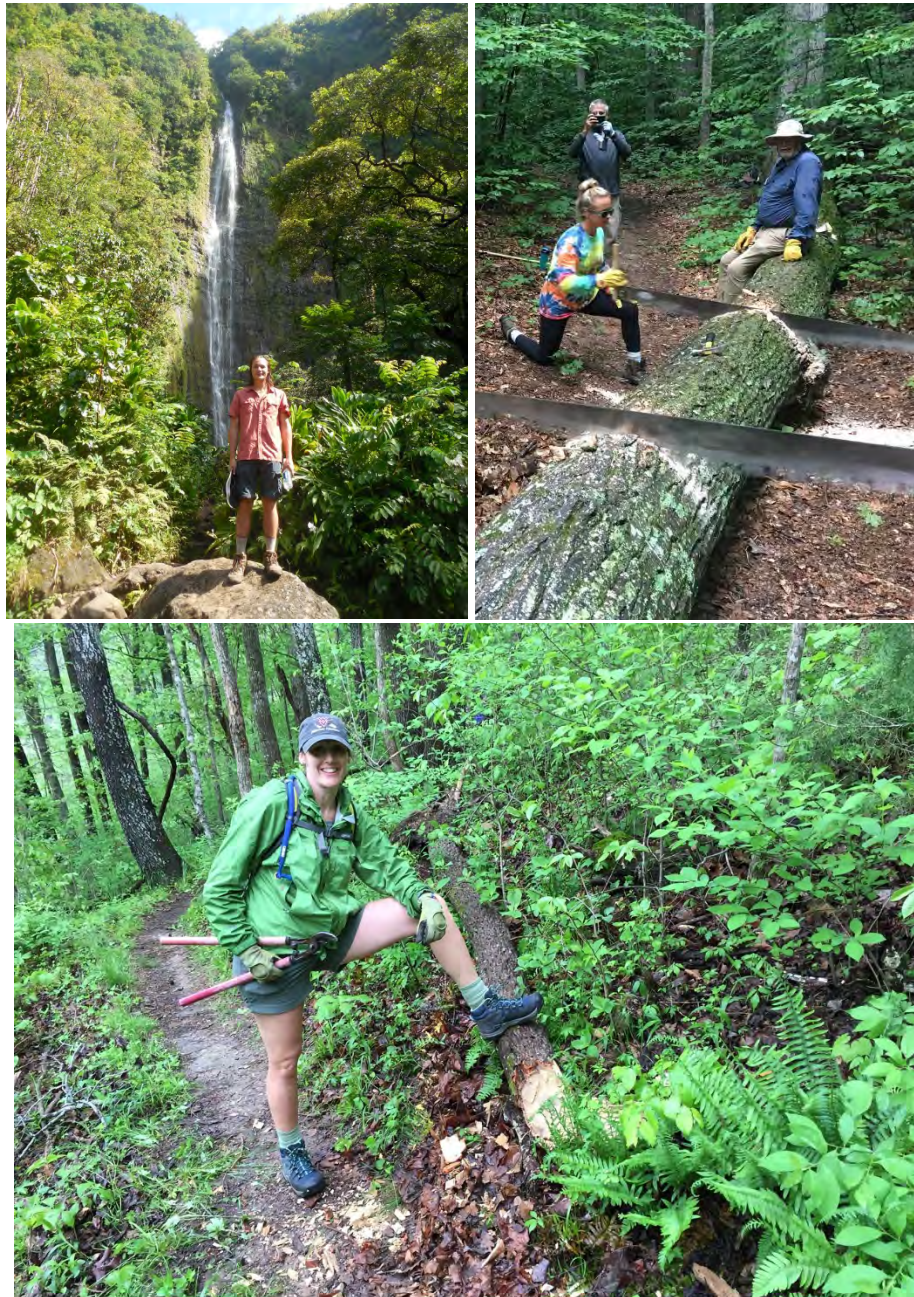
